Unless your score *far exceeds* the average at all of your prospective schools, you will want to dedicate some time to prepping before you take an official test. **Improving your score by even a hundred points on the SAT or 1 point on the ACT can significantly boost your chances of admission at many schools. – Princeton Review**

Tips for the FWISD Testing Timeline

9th Grade:

• Students who are taking Pre-AP English or Math should practice the PSAT/NMSQT prior to testing in **October** of their 9th grade year.

10th Grade:

- All students should practice the PSAT prior to testing in **October** of their 10th grade year.
- Upon receiving test scores, students should sign-up for personalized test practice via Khan Academy.

11th Grade:

- Students should practice the PSAT prior to testing in **October** of their 11th grade year.
- Upon receiving test scores, students should sign-up for personalized test practice via Khan Academy (www.satpractice.org) to prepare for the **School Day SAT** in **March**.
- Students should practice the ACT via ACT Academy (www.academy.act.org) to prepare for the **School Day ACT** in **March**.

12th Grade:

• Students may re-test for the ACT and/or SAT as needed by registering for the test in the Go Center located on their high school campus. Fee waivers are available for students in grades 11 and 12.
